The first great battle is already under way.

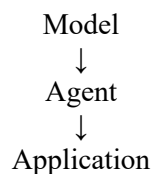
- Frontier laboratories are racing to produce increasingly capable models.

The second layer – applications

An even larger market is now emerging.

Thousands of companies are building:

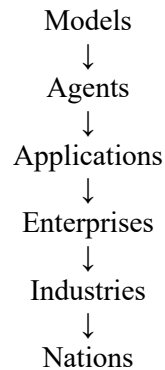
- agents;

The third layer – cognition infrastructure

- The infrastructure layer evolves cautiously.
- The first rewards speed.
- The second rewards trust.

The winner-take-all problem

Satya Nadella recently observed that winner-take-all markets are often fundamentally at odds with the principles of a healthy free-enterprise system.

History suggests that he is correct.

An infrastructure provider possesses extraordinary influence because it observes the relationships among all participants.

That is precisely why the infrastructure layer must remain neutral.

The GUDIYA Grid cannot favor:

- open models;
- closed models;
- American models;
- Chinese models;
- large enterprises;
- small enterprises;
- particular political systems;
- specific technologies.

Its purpose is not to choose winners. Its purpose is to preserve stability.

Why GUDIYA should remain a not-for-profit institution

The most trusted infrastructure in the world often shares a common characteristic.

- Its mission is stewardship rather than domination.
- The purpose of a stabilization grid is not to maximize revenue. Its purpose is to maximize resilience, transparency, interoperability, and trust.
- A commercial organization can build products on top of the grid.
- Commercial organizations can connect themselves to the grid.
- Commercial organizations can compete within the ecosystem.
- But the grid itself should remain independent.

The paradox of infrastructure

- The greatest infrastructure is almost invisible.
- Passengers do not think about air-traffic control.
- Drivers do not think about synchronized traffic signals.
- Citizens do not think about the electrical grid.
- People simply expect these systems to work.
- The same may eventually become true of the cognitive economy.

How GUDIYA sees the future

- GUDIYA does not seek to create the most intelligent model.
- It does not seek to build the most profitable application.
- It does not seek to dominate the market.
- Its purpose is much simpler.
- It seeks to ensure that the countless forms of intelligence created by humanity can coexist safely, reliably, and sustainably.
- The future belongs to intelligence.
- But the future also belongs to stability.
- And stability is infrastructure.
